It's been a wonderful first week back in school. The children have enjoyed finding out more about their study themes. Warmingham PTA gives each class £250 to spend on their 'Wow' starters across the year. Hedgehogs Class used some of their money to a arrange an owl workshop. The children thoroughly enjoyed meeting the owls. The writing they produced on Tuesday was full of interesting facts about owls. Did you know that the colour of an owl's eyes determines when they come out to fly? Without your support, the PTA wouldn't be able to raise the funds to enhance the children's learning. Squirrels Class has used some of their money to organise a circus workshop later this term.

Yesterday, some of the children from Badgers' Class took part in a hockey tournament at Deeside. Miss Turrell was impressed with their skills and sportsmanship. 

What's happening in school this term?

Otters' Class




Otters' second study theme is 'Lets celebrate'. We will use the fantastic text 'Lets celebrate' by Kate DePalma. This beautifully illustrated book will guide us to experience a child's-eye view of celebrations around the world. Our spectacular starter will involve planning a special birthday for Fred Frog. Using our own understanding and experiences of celebrations such as birthdays and Christmas we will learn about different celebrations and cultures. We will join in special services in school as we mark Remembrance Day as a collective and then celebrate Christingle and finally our Nativity production!

Hedgehogs' Class

This half term, Hedgehogs' Class are learning about our continued geography based study theme, 'Land, Sea and Sky', as we explore the text, 'The Owl who was Afraid of the Dark' by Jill Tomlinson.


Plop, the Baby Barn Owl, is like every Barn Owl there ever was, except for one thing - he is afraid of the dark. "Dark is nasty" he says and so he won't go hunting with his parents. Mrs Barn Owl sends him down from his nest-hole to ask about the dark and he meets a little boy waiting for the fireworks to begin, an old lady, a scout out camping, a girl who tells him about Father Christmas, a man with a telescope and a black cat who takes him exploring. He realizes that through these encounters that dark is super after all.



This inspirational book (along with some feathery-friend visitors), will hook us into learning about owls. We will develop our descriptive writing and write non-chronological reports about owls. We will continue to be enthused as we delve into all the other areas of our connected curriculum: As geographers, we will be comparing the UK with other non-European countries and learning where different owls live. As artists, we will create observational drawings of owls and using this knowledge will create owl collages. As Scientists, we will be learning about 'Animals', looking closely at life cycles and food chains involving owls. As historians, we will look at significant events in British history as we learn about The Gunpowder Plot and Remembrance. Another action-packed half-term of learning.

Squirrels' Class

This half term, Squirrels class are taking a trip to the circus with our learning focused around the book **'Leon and the place between'**. Leon adored magic and after volunteering to be in Abdul Kazam's magic show gets transported into a mysterious world.




Our study theme this half term has a STEM focus. As designers, we will be learning to design and create a moving circus scene using pulley mechanisms. The children will be exploring different mechanisms and choosing a suitable design for their scene.

As artists, we will be focussing on the art of circus posters. We will explore colour, design and wording to then create our own circus posters. Our fantastic finish will see the circus come to visit. The children will have the opportunity to take part in a workshop where they will be able to take part in circus skills and tricks.

Badgers' Class

This term's study theme, 'The Rainforest' stems from the book 'Can We Save the Tiger?' by Martin Jenkins. It is a visually stunning and informative picture book about the world's endangered animals. Tigers are big, beautiful and fierce. But, like many other animals, they are in danger of becoming extinct. With breathtaking illustrations this picture book tells us about the threats to the many endangered species on our planet and the need to prevent their extinction.



As **Geographers**, we will be taking a closer look at the mysteries of tropical rainforests. From the layers of the forest and its animal inhabitants, to the unique climate found in the tropics. We will use of previous learning to compare a British forest with the rainforest, before we explore some of the conservation issues surrounding the destruction of rainforest habitats. We will then use all of our new knowledge to represent a specific role in a class debate about deforestation.

As **Artists**, we will be studying the painting 'Tropical Storm with Tiger' by Henri Rousseau. We will then develop our sketching and printing skills to create our own pictures of a tiger in the jungle.

As **Designers**, we are going to learn more about levers and linkage mechanisms before we design and make a moving rainforest animal out of card. Afterwards we will evaluate our models so we can improve our models.

Fantastic Finish

As **Geographers**, we will be taking part in a class debate about deforestation. Each of us will be given a specific role which we have to represent in the debate:

- Logger
- Pharmacist
- Conservationist
- Inhabitant
- Government official
- Fast-food restaurant owner
- Environmental scientist
- Cattle farmer

Wraparound Provision

You'll be pleased to know that we are in the final stages of setting our wraparound care and if everything goes to plan, we should be up and running from the start of next term. The breakfast club will run from 7:30am to 8:30am when the children will be taken to class. The after-school club will run from 3:15pm to 6pm. You should be able to start booking places from 1st December 2024.

Nursery

Thank you to all of you who took part in last term's consultation. Your comments were discussed at length at the governors meeting before half term. The new government would like more schools to have a school-based nursery, and have provided extra funding for schools to access. We are in the process of applying for a grant which will hopefully allow us to replace the conservatory with a much larger version with its own small kitchen area and toilets. As part of the grant, we are also hoping to improve Otter's outdoor provision as well as putting another conservatory just outside of the kitchen for us to use before, during and after school. This will mean that we will be able to offer 12 nursery places to children who will be turning four during that academic year (known as rising 3's). These children will be in a class with the 12 reception children. There will be a minimum of two adults: a fully qualified teacher and a specialist EYFS teaching assistant. The grant application needs to be completed later this term, and we should hear back earlier next term so we will hopefully be able to welcome some nursery children into our Warmingham family from September 2024.


