

In sport there are definitely different kinds of fouls.

There are the unintentional ones. A player gets in the way of play causing an obstruction. There are the unfortunate mistimed ones, the ones where the player has already offloaded the ball and the tackle comes in too late. There are the cheeky ones, the player thinks they might just get away with, ref might not be looking,



no one is going to get hurt. And there are the cynical ones. The classic footballer through on goal and the last defender clips their heels. Deliberately committed for their teams gain.

In many ways there are similarities between sport and our lives. We sin, we miss the standards that God sets for us. Sometimes accidentally getting ourselves in the wrong place. We unintentionally fall short of God's standards. Sometimes, we have misunderstood a situation and said things, an unfortunate mistimed comment. Occasionally, we hope God is not looking, and cheekily allow ourselves to do something we know is wrong. Not often I hope, but there are times when we can be cynical in our behaviour towards God and others.

Lent helps us to think about our actions. In a number of sports, when you commit a foul, you can end up in the 'sin bin' and a few moments off the pitch to think about what you have done wrong. In many ways Lent is a bit like a sin bin, one where we choose to step out of the chaos for a while to stop and reflect upon our actions, preparing our hearts and minds. We use Lent to reflect on how we have hurt God and other people. It helps us to see where we have fallen short and recognise where we are at fault. It also helps us to say sorry.

Another way sport can help us to reflect in Lent is to think about the moment when a foul has been committed. The VAR or TMO look over the incident again and again, pundits discussing what would be the appropriate punishment.

Lent encourages believers to look back at their failings and again and again to Easter and the remarkable truth that for the believer, despite the offence

being cynical, they are forgiven. Not because no foul has been committed, but because Christ has taken the punishment on their behalf.

Maybe if you watch any sport this Lent, you might use the time when play is stopped after a foul to think about your own life, how we all miss God's standards, and what Easter has got to say about it.
